KEEPING OUR STREETS SAFE

We deserve to be safe, and feel safe, in our homes. Yet we know that our community has been victim to ongoing aggravated burglaries and home invasions. Sadly, the State Labor Government has ignored these crimes. The solution is simple. We need more police resources and a new Brighton Police Station. Instead, the Government has confirmed an intention to shut Bayside Police Station at night. We also need to toughen the law and fix the bail system.

STOPPING INAPPROPRIATE DEVELOPMENT

The State Labor Government has confirmed their intention to grow Melbourne's population from 5 to 9 million people. To cater for that massive growth, the Government has announced that it has picked certain suburbs to be 'mega-suburbs' that will be forced to host apartment towers up to 20 storeys high in the mains streets and up to 6 storeys in an almost one kilometre circumference to the main streets. Growth is needed, but it should be fairly shared across the whole State.
